Robin Higham



Robin Higham is a retired Canadian career diplomat, currently recycled in a variety of Ottawa-based cultural, academic and international-relations activities. Upon retirement from DFAIT, he was appointed Foreign Service Visitor at the Canadian Studies Institute of the University of Ottawa and subsequently Senior Fellow at the Centre on Governance and the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs. His university work has focused primarily on: 1. Research into the cultural priority on Canada's national agenda, and 2. The governance of culturally diverse societies and the integration of immigrant newcomers. In 2012, he was awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal for his work in the cultural sector. Robin was a founding board member of The Leading Note Foundation and remains active as an OrKidstra groupie. As a youngster he

spent seven years with the Edmonton Schoolboy's Band where he experienced first-hand the learning and personal development opportunities available to young people through participatory music programmes. He consequently became an immediate and dedicated champion of Sistema-inspired programs. Four of his grandchildren are benefitting from active music making. The other four are serving time differently.

Simon Brault, O.C., Q.C. Director & CEO Canada Council for the Arts



Simon Brault began his five-year term as Director and CEO of the Canada Council for the Arts on June 26, 2014. He comes to the position with a full understanding of his role, having served as Vice-Chair of the Council's Board of Directors from 2004 to 2014.

Mr Brault is a tireless champion of public engagement in the arts. In recognition of his many accomplishments, Mr. Brault was made an Officer of the Order of Canada, fellow of the CGA, Officier de l'Ordre national du Québec, and received the 2009 Keith Kelly Award for Cultural Leadership, awarded by the Canadian Conference of the Arts.

Richard Hallam, MBE
Chair of the Music Education Council, England



Mr. Hallam has been a professional musician, teacher, curriculum advisor, inspector, head of music service and conductor. His national involvement in UK music education spans over 20 years. This includes being Chair of the National Association of Music Educators; Warden of Incorporated Society of Musicians' Music Education Section, and a member of the Music Education Council executive. Richard has undertaken music education research throughout this period, including presenting at international conferences as well as music education conferences in the UK. In addition to writing articles and contributing to chapters in several books his research on 'Effective Partnership Working in Music Education' was published in the International Journal of Music

Education. In addition to serving on numerous charitable, government and curriculum advisory bodies, he chaired the Music Manifesto steering committee in his capacity as Government Adviser from 2003 to 2011, becoming the National Music Participation Director in 2008. He continued this work under the coalition government, assisting with the Henley Review of Music Education and acting as the Department for Education's consultant for the National Plan for Music Education.

In November 2012 he received the Music Teacher of the Year Lifetime Achievement Award from Classic FM. He is currently a trustee of several music education related charities including *Sistema England*; Chair of the Music Education Council (2013/2016); Past President of Incorporated Society of Musicians (2014/2015); former chair of the International Society for Music Education's Sistema Special Interest Group (2012/2014) as well as being on the advisory boards of *Sistema Europe* and *Sistema Global*; and a freelance music education consultant.

David Visentin
Executive & Artistic Director, Sistema Toronto



David Visentin is widely known as a performer, pedagogue and administrator whose leadership and creative experience in the performing arts has successfully advanced classical music from coast to coast in Canada. He is the founding Executive and Artistic Director of Sistema Toronto (www.sistema-toronto.ca) - a free and developmentally transformative after-school social program through the pursuit of musical excellence designed for children and based on the remarkable Venezuelan model known around the world as *El Sistema*. David has worked with orchestras across Canada and in Japan, and for six years he was the dean of The Royal Conservatory of Music's Young Artist Performance Academy and associate dean of The Glenn Gould School. A highly acclaimed chamber musician on both violin and viola, David Visentin founded the Boreas String Quartet, Mondetta Ensemble, Atlantic String Quartet and is currently the Artistic Director of the Salt Spring Chamber Music Festival. He plays a 1783 Gabrielli violin and a 1870 Fagnola viola. When he has time, he rides a 2002 Battaglin Italian racing bike and, last year, took part in the L'Etape de Tour Alpe d'Huez stage of the Tour de France. This year he will be riding the tour again in support of Sistema Toronto.

Section 12: Workshop Descriptions

KiddlyWinks

Working with Ms. Cendrine Despax, OrKidstra created the KiddlyWinks program as a joyful, fun filled, value-based music program for young children (primarily grades 1 through 4). Using the full body as an instrument along with recorder and xylophone, the children sing, dance, and express rhythm from within. Through solfège singing, the musical ear is developed, and reading is taught by applying a musical legend to active note reading. Evident throughout the guideline, the KiddlyWinks program fulfills the C1 Ministry of Education music education curriculum requirements for students in grades 1 to 2.

These workshops will reflect the essence of the *KiddlyWinks* program itself. They will be high energy, handson, and interactive.



Cendrine Despax: professional violinist, Cendrine studied with master violinist Calvin Sieb and Anne Robert. She is a graduate of the Conservatoire de musique de Montréal where she was awarded many prestigious awards. Since 2003, she has been the first violinist of the Quatuor Despax. She has also been part of the Orchestre Symphonique de Gatineau (OSG) since its inception in 2007. She performs regularly in the National Capital and Montreal. In addition to being the music teacher for *KiddlyWinks* she teaches violin at the École Élément Publique Francojeunesse, York Street Public School, Cambridge Street Public School, les Violons en Fête and in her private studio.

So, you want to teach strings? – Theodora Stathopoulos

If you are not a string player, teaching strings may seem like an insurmountable task. If you are someone who feels this way, this workshop is for you because during this workshop you will gain the knowledge and confidence you need to start and maintain your beginner string class. Specific routines and procedures will ensure correct playing posture, solid sound production and will guarantee classroom management and student engagement. Timelines for moving on to the next steps will be provided and classroom games that solidify technique will be shared. The violin will be used as the model instrument but participants will be guided in how to identify and switch students to other instruments of the string family. A side benefit: you will get a head start in learning to play a string instrument yourself! Instruments for the workshop will be provided.



Theodora Stathopoulos has been a music educator for 35 years. Since 1998 she has been the head of the Fine Arts Core Education (FACE) School's String Department, where she founded the FACE Symphony Orchestra with its unique educational program. Her passion for music education has carried her beyond the walls of her classroom. Among other achievements she was instrumental in revitalizing the Quebec Music Educators Association (QMEA) in 2004, is a founding member of the Canadian Network for Arts and Learning (CNAL), has served on the International Society's for Music Education (ISME) Board of Directors and was President of the QMEA and of the Canadian Music Educators Association (CMEA). For her many achievements she was awarded the Canadian Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence in 2006. Since 2008 she has been actively involved in advancing the El Sistema movement in Quebec, Canada and internationally by convening the first two Sistema Symposia in Canada (UWO May 2011/McGill November 2011) and initiating ISME's Sistema Special Interest Group (SIG) in 2011. In 2012, under the auspices of QMEA she spearheaded the Viva!Sistema after school program in two distinct Montreal communities.





Emotional Intelligence – Clark Bryan

What are the transferable social skills we want our program participants to learn? What are the social skills needed for our rapidly changing world?

Most people have some idea of what "Emotional Intelligence" is, but are there ways we can cultivate it and learn to improve and apply it in our daily lives? Can we find ways in our teaching and learning to consciously create opportunities to strengthen and grow Emotional Intelligence?

Changing the Orff Process in Batuta – Music for Social Change– Eugene Negrii

My workshop will describe the details that led up to applying for a McBurney Latin American fellowship grant through McGill University's Institute for Health and Social Policy. The body of my presentation will discuss the project rationale and its initial goals. Afterwards, in each location in Colombia (Bogota, Santa Marta, and Manizales), I will focus on the specific challenges, successes, and overall recommendations I had for Batuta as a whole.



Born and raised in Montreal, Quebec; **Eugene** received a Bachelor in Jazz performance from Humber College in 2004, and his B.Ed from York University the following year. Upon completing his education degree Eugene moved to Al Khobar, Saudi Arabia where he taught grade 4 classroom at International Programs School from 2005 to 2008. In 2008 he moved to Singapore where he started his career as a Pre-K to grade 5 music specialist at EtonHouse International School. After two years in Singapore while attending an international job fair in Bangkok, Eugene accepted a position at Jakarta International School in Indonesia, teaching grade 1 to 5 general music using an Orff-based approach, in addition to Javanese gamelan. In 2013 he decided to return to Montreal to complete

a Master's in Music Education at McGill University (April/2015). In addition to being fully Orff certified, Eugene has taken extensive professional development workshops around the world with Doug Goodkin, James Harding, J.S. Kofi Gbolonyo, Keith Terry and Will Schmid. Eugene has also spent considerable time in Ghana studying drumming dancing and gyil, and has a strong interest in world music and how it applies to the Orff approach.






Look Who's Doing the Right Thing - Chelsey Hiebert

Addressing the social needs of students is a key component to serving the mission of Sistema inspired programs. Sistema NB uses three principles for behavior expectation to help address these needs. In using these principles consistently and positively students are taught accountability. This approach sets the foundation for behavior management.



Chelsey Hiebert is currently the Centre Director and oboe Teaching Artist at Sistema New Brunswick's Moncton Centre. She holds a Diploma in Chamber Music from Wilfrid Laurier University and a Bachelor of Music degree in oboe performance from Brandon University. As a passionate teacher and performer Chelsey works with more than a dozen young oboists across New Brunswick and performs regularly with both Tutta Musica and Symphony New Brunswick.

Bringing Improv Into the Classroom - Margaret Tobolowksa

This workshop will address practical tools and improve games that can be incorporated into rehearsal time to encourage an atmosphere of sharing, creating and having fun in a group environment!

Margaret Maria is a dynamic, versatile, and multi-faceted artist. Not only does she perform as a solo recitalist and chamber musician, Margaret Maria is passionate about teaching and working with cellists of all ages, at all stages. Born in Toronto, Margaret Maria began playing the cello at the age of 12 and was admitted to the University of Toronto when she was 16. She received her BMus in Performance in 1992 and continued, on full scholarship at the prestigious Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia (class of '94).

As teaching and children are the heart of Margaret's work, she co-founded and is an honorary board member at The Leading Note Foundation's *OrKidstra* Program. In April 2012, Margaret Maria was a recipient of the Leading Women Building Communities Award by the Government of Ontario for her work in the Ottawa community and was also recognized as a Kick Ass Canadian!

"Tuning In" the Developing Brain: Neurocognitive Effects of Ensemble Music Training on Children - Kylie Schibli

Can involvement in an El Sistema-inspired program, OrKidstra, help children pay attention and show impulse control? In this presentation, I will share preliminary findings from a research study exploring this question with promising results. We assessed the cognitive neurocorrelates of executive attention using event-related potentials (ERPs) as children between the ages of 9-12 years with and without OrKidstra training completed an auditory computerized attention task. Our findings raise important questions for the value of participation in social music programs for instilling self-regulation skills in children. The ability to self-regulate has been associated with school-readiness and academic achievement indicating that our research may have implications for music training interventions and music training implementation in the school setting.



Kylie Schibli graduated with a Master of Science in Neuroscience in 2014 and completed her BA with Honours in Child Studies at Carleton University. Her research centers on child development by examining factors that may influence children's ability to selectively attend and demonstrate inhibitory control. She is a recipient of the Joseph-Armand Bombardier Canada Graduate Scholarship (CGS) from Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (2012-2013). Her most recent work involves exploring how participation in a social music program, OrKidstra, can influence children's ability to self-regulate.

Peer Leadership in Sistema – Marcus Patterson

Marcus Patteson will discuss the formal peer leadership programme that Sistema in Norwich has been piloting, extending and developing the natural leadership by young people that exists within the Sistema model.



Marcus Patteson is Programme Director for Sistema in Norwich, and Executive Director of Norwich & Norfolk Community Arts Marcus designed, developed and has led Norwich's Sistema programme since its inception in 2009, one of many such programmes he has developed across a range of art forms since forming NORCA in 2001. A practicing community musician since 1997, Marcus is a classically trained singer and specialist in Brazilian music, performing regularly with his band, Rabo de Foguete.

In Harmony – Stories from England – Mandie Haywood

In this workshop, Mandie will share Old Park Primary School's Sistema journey and the impact that it has had on the children, staff and the wider community.



Mandie Haywood is Headteacher of Old Park Primary School, Telford, UK which opened in September 2007 following the amalgamation of three local schools. High deprivation and low aspirations were characteristics of the community that Old Park Primary serves. Since then the school has worked tirelessly to transform the curriculum and change attitudes to learning.

In 2011 Old Park won the TES Outstanding Primary School of the Year Award in recognition of their innovative approach to the curriculum. Following this the school was offered an In Harmony (Sistema) programme. Currently all 650 pupils have weekly music lessons, while 360 children receive an additional 2 hours of instrumental lessons 13 and orchestra





Growing Creativity & Engagement in Your Music Class – Jeannie Hunter

Strategies for growing the capacity for creativity in your music class while enabling students to become lifelong musicians. Engage students in your classroom and beyond while promoting musical excellence in a fun, funny and inspiring atmosphere. Includes ideas for: creating music, encouraging collaboration, the use of humour in music, projects/summatives and classroom structure. Build a dynamic classroom that empowers students!



Jeannie Hunter teaches instrumental music, vocal music, world music and percussion at Hillcrest High School in Ottawa. A classically trained trumpet player, she found her real passion when she began to study world music and combine the field of music with an interest in social justice and development. She believes strongly in the use of world music as a tool for cross-cultural understanding, awareness and has studied traditions from West & South Africa, the Middle East, Brazil, Latin America, Indonesia and Jamaica. She founded Brookfield's World Voices Choir, who have released two CDs: "Ubuntu: Humanity Towards Others" and "We Have a Dream". Funds from the CDs support the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund, Micro Credit loans in developing countries and global awareness within their school and community.

The panel that will follow the presentation will be comprised of some of the ETAP program's most enthusiastic, dynamic and extraordinary students & alumni. They will share their stories and experiences about being an ETAP and will be open to answer any and all questions.
